

raining resources consist of time, ammunition and money. For most of us, these are finite quantities, so we need to make the most of our training opportunities. I designed the Casino Drill to allow a shooter to practice and evaluate a number of skills in a single exercise and get the most benefit from a small amount of ammo. This one drill tests a rapid presentation from concealment; fast multiple shots on a demanding target; rapid target acquisition on multiple targets at odd angles; target identification; two forced reloads under time pressure; and keeping up with what's going on, all while shooting.

This is far more beneficial practice than just standing there firing pairs at

a silhouette target.

The drill requires a DT-2A target, which is available from Action Target (www.actiontarget.com). The numbered shapes are the same size as the truly vital area in a grown man's chest, so a hit inside the shapes would be an anatomically valuable hit on a human attacker.

The shooter begins with seven rounds loaded in the pistol and two sevenround spare magazines (7/7/7, hence the name, Casino Drill). The pistol is holstered and concealed. The distance is five yards. On signal, the shooter will draw and shoot #1 one time, #2 two times, #3 three times, #4 four times, #5 five times, and #6 six times. Each time the gun runs dry, the shooter reloads and continues. The shooter must shoot the targets in numerical sequence, and shoot the correct number of shots on each target. When reloading, the shooter must remember to finish the target he was on when the gun ran empty. 100% hits are required. The time limit is 21 seconds.

We use this drill in classes to inject stress and to introduce the shooter to running the motor program (shooting, reloading) while processing Tom Givens

information (target sequence, finishing a target after a reload), all while under time pressure. After a few runs, we culminate the exercise with having each shooter perform the drill solo, in front of the entire class. This is a great way to check the shooter's ability under stress and see how well automated his skills really are. Recently, Captain James Hale of the Oconee County Sheriff's Office (Georgia) set a new record with a clean run in 10.33 seconds. I consider anything under 15 or 16 seconds to be really good performance. By the way, the time only counts if done in class, in front of all your peers, so don't start

sending me reports of your 10 second

There are numerous variations of this drill, and changing it up is very useful. Here are some variations I like:

- Load the magazines with 6, 7, and 8 rounds, then shuffle them. This randomizes the reloads.
- Shoot it backwards, starting at #6 and working down to #1.
- Shoot all the odd numbers, then all the even numbers.

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- Put a dummy cartridge in one of the magazines, then shuffle them. This causes a sudden, unexpected malfunction during the drill.
- Have a training partner shout out a number. Your task is to shoot all the targets, except that one. This is harder than it sounds.

If I only had one DT-2A target and 50 rounds for a practice session, here is what I would do to maximize the benefit of that ammo and range time:

- Casino Drill, cold (21 rounds)
- 5 yards, target #1 (4 rounds), dominant hand only, two times
- 5 yards, target #6 (4 rounds), nondominant hand only, two times
- 5 yards, target #4 (1 round from the holster), ten times
- 15 yards, target #5 (3 rounds)

That's 50 rounds, covering most of the things you need to be able to do on demand with a handgun. Your goal would be 100% hits, always working to get those hits reliably, faster. A focused regimen like this one will do a lot more for skill development than 200 rounds just shooting a silhouette target without a specific goal.

am often told that people "cannot" do certain things under the stress of a real-life threat. Usually, this is just an excuse not to train and to be content with having no real skills. The video linked above shows a surprise gunfight, with three armed robbers initiating a sudden robbery against a single armed security guard. There are three different surveillance cameras, so we get a good idea of what transpired. Please watch a few times: tiny.cc/robbery-attempt.

First, the robbers run into the building. Two have guns already in hand, plus one has a bag for the loot they anticipate getting. As they burst through the inner door, they have the advantage of already having their guns out, plus surprise.

The security officer does NOT exhibit any so-called "startle response," such as throwing his hands up. His hands go directly to his holstered pistol, which he presents immediately. The officer goes to two hands at eye level and shoots carefully, getting hits. Oops, I forgot... we can't teach people to do that.

The two armed robbers are thoroughly disconcerted by the guard's immediate, violent, and resolute response. They are rendered completely ineffective and flee clumsily. One drops his gun on the way out the door as he frantically tries to escape. I'd say their OODA cycle was disrupted a bit.

The security officer used simple lateral movement (side-steps) to accomplish several things:

- He used his security station as a visual barrier, allowing him to engage one offender at a time while blocking the other's view.
- He kept moving, further confusing and confounding the bad guys.
- By moving, he was able to keep the offenders in his sight.

As soon as he was able, he moved to a corridor opening, giving him a somewhat concealed position as he covered the door, in case they came back in. This shows he kept his wits about him and continued to think tactically, despite having been attacked completely by surprise.

This is how it's done.

The Pew Research Center is a think tank that generates research on wide variety of social issues. They


recently conducted a fairly large survey on gun ownership, and found some interesting information.

One quick take-away from this survey: the reasons Americans own guns have shifted considerably since

1999. Now, instead of sporting applications, the majority of gun owners cite protection as their primary reason for owning a gun. Those citing "protection" as their reason for owning a gun went from 26% in 1999, to 48% in 2013, to 67% in 2017. This is quite a shift in thinking for many people.



# Tom Givens Firearms Production and Sales

I frequently point out how critical it is to develop local, grass-roots level firearms trainers. Each year, millions of people buy guns for the first time, and they desperately need proper introductory training to keep them from becoming a greater threat to their families than are the Bad Guys. Remember, most people grow up now in urban environments and don't have early exposure to firearms like in days past. We get kids in police academies now who have literally

never touched a gun before. Each year the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (BATFE) puts out a report on gun production and sales. Here are a few tidbits from their latest report (July 2017).

In 2016, FFLs conducted 15,700,471 NICS background checks for gun purchases. Yes, that's almost 16 million gun purchases in a single year. In 2014 the total was 13,090,383; and in 2015 the total was 14,244,240. That's a grand total of 43,035,094 in just three years! Of those 43 million gun purchases, an awful lot were made by first time buyers. Note that this number only includes sales at licensed FFL dealers, not private individual sales.

#### **Top U.S. gun manufacturers of 2015:**

 Those numbers include all firearms. Here are the recent production numbers for handguns alone:

2013 ... 5,167,008 handguns

2014 ... 4,377,501 handguns

### MEMPHIS

just went through a detailed report on the homicides reported in my old stomping grounds in Memphis. From January 1, 2017, until August 9, 2017, there were a total of 122 homicides in the city. None of these involved police the victim and the offender are not known to each other. These are most often street robberies and car-jacking incidents.

The break-down of motives listed

The break-down of motives listed was as follows:

• **Unknown: 91** cases (usually a robbery or attempted robbery)

• Argument: 11 cases

• **Robbery: 10** cases (in these the motive was evident)

• **Domestic: 8** cases

• Gang related: 1 case

Thus, "Robbery" and "Unknown" accounted for 83% of the homicides.

Note that only 1 case was determined to be gang related. This shows that by far the greatest threat is from a robbery or unknown (usually turns out to be a robbery or attempted robbery in some form). These are crimes that are committed in public places, such as convenience stores, shopping centers, and office parking lots. Be vigilant, and carry your gear.
